Loaves and Fishes is a well-known charitable organization in Sacramento, serving it's most desperate and destitute citizens in its commitment to provide "food, warmth, and a path home for homeless men, women and children." Inmate Odis had been a beneficiary of their charity. He repaid them by burglarizing the facilities, leaving destruction in his path and stealing a laptop, money, ID cards, wallets and other items.

Inmate Collier has been a leach on society for the past 32 years. In 1984 he was arrested for 12 counts of burglary, and convicted of 7 counts. He was sentenced to 12 years in State Prison. At least one, if not all of those burglaries, were strikes. Due to the passage of years, the details are lost to history.

When he parole he began a pattern which he would continue for 25 years. He immediately violated parole by committing a misdemeanor battery on an officer. Later in 1992, he was convicted of being a felon in possession of a firearm and he was returned to prison for his 2nd prison commitment and 8th felony conviction.

He paroled in 1994 and was promptly convicted of resisting arrest. He violated parole repeatedly from 1995 – 1997. Then in 1998 he was convicted of his next strike offense: another residential burglary. This earned him a 15 year prison sentence.

He paroled on 5/8/11 and was arrested for his first parole violation 10 days later. He repeatedly violated parole in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014. He was finally discharged from parole in 2015. He committed his current burglary the following year.

Inmate Collier will not change. If he's not breaking into homes, he's breaking into charitable organizations designed to aid the homeless. He presents an unreasonable risk of danger to the community and his release should therefore be denied.
