Board of Parole Members,

Inmate Martinez has shown a propensity towards violence, gangs, and firearms, and he is not a good candidate for early release.

On October 20, 2008, Inmate Martinez was convicted for committing a first degree residential burglary. While the victim and his wife slept, Inmate Martinez broke into the victim's vehicle, then used the garage door opener to gain access and completely ransacked the garage. Fortunately Inmate Martinez left fingerprints behind that enabled law enforcement to trace him to this crime. [REDACTED] Inmate Martinez [REDACTED] received a slap on the wrist and was only sentenced to 270 days in county jail and probation. However, rather than viewing this as a wakeup call, Inmate Martinez continued his criminal endeavors almost immediately upon his release.

In November of 2009, Inmate Martinez was arrested in possession of stolen property and sentenced to four years in state prison due to his prior strike. In addition to this, while on Post Release Supervision Inmate Martinez was violated for testing positive for cocaine. Once again he had an opportunity to stay clear of criminal conduct, and yet our most recent offense shows that he has done anything but that.

On May 2, 2015, Inmate Martinez was pulled over for DUI. His blood alcohol level was substantially over the legal limit, and perhaps more concerning was that he possessed a loaded handgun under his seat with a high capacity magazine. This combined with his gang affiliation with the Norteno Criminal Street Gang shows that Inmate Martinez is seeking a life of crime and violence.

Despite this criminal history, Inmate Martinez is now seeking early release. Inmate Martinez' disregard for the law and participation in a gang that thrives on violence, criminal behavior, and harming others shows that he is not an appropriate candidate for early release. In the interest of public safety and justice, the Sacramento District Attorney's Office strongly opposes Inmate Jones' early release.
