RE: RODRIC STANLEY CDC # AW9407

Inmate Stanley's criminal record shows he is a habitual thief and also that he has a violent streak. The combination of these two is dangerous, especially given that he is breaking into homes where victims could be present. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community. He should not be released on parole.

Inmate Stanley's current offense arose when he was caught with a significant amount of stolen property from a house next door that had been burglarized that very morning. Although he was only charged with receipt of stolen property, it was clear how the evidence came out at trial that he was present and most likely involved in the actual burglary. On 7/20/14 a homeowner heard her doorbell ring and saw inmate Stanley's friend at her door. He wanted her Wi-Fi password. She had seen him next door but did not know him, and she said no and subsequently left her home to go to work. Shortly thereafter a different neighbor called her and said her home was being burglarized. When police arrived her house was *completely* ransacked. An alert police officer noticed a suspicious van next door. Inmate Stanley was caught with his friends in this van with all of the victim's stolen property – a TV and other electronic equipment. Inmate Stanley had the homeowner's jewelry in his pocket. A witness testified at trial that he saw people carrying items from the homeowner's residence to the house where inmate Stanley was located with the stolen items. The owner of the house where the stolen items were located testified that inmate Stanley was at her home that morning, during the time of the burglary. After a trial, inmate Stanley was convicted of felony receipt of stolen property.

On 4/4/14 inmate Stanley violated a restraining order by breaking into the home of his ex-girlfriend through a window and stole her Sony 55-inch flat screen TV. Officers contacted inmate Stanley nearby with the TV in his possession shortly after, and he admitted he threw a rock through his ex-girlfriend's window to get into her house and that he used his fist to punch out the loose glass. He also admitted taking her TV. He was convicted of a misdemeanor violation of Penal Code section 273.6.


On 3/24/14 inmate Stanley wanted to take his girlfriend's car even though he did not have a license. He got into a verbal fight with her and he escalated it into a physical fight. When victim tried to escape him by going into the bathroom, Stanley kicked the door in. Once inside the bathroom, Stanley grabbed his girlfriend by the neck, picked her up, took her out of the bathroom, threw her against a couch, and after grabbing her by the face, spit in her face. Stanley then left the residence,

grabbed a child's scooter and hit his girlfriend's vehicle with it, denting the door and hood of her vehicle. He was convicted of a misdemeanor violation of Penal Code Section 243(e)(1).

On 5/22/13 inmate Stanley was convicted of a felony burglary. On 7/19/10 inmate Stanley was convicted of felony receipt of stolen property. On 4/28/10 inmate Stanley was convicted of felony vehicle theft. On 7/28/09 he was convicted of misdemeanor vehicle theft. [REDACTED]

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on inmate Stanley's prison conduct. However, from the record that is available it is clear that inmate Stanley should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
