Inmate Haines is a well-established violent felon, and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Inmate Haines was on felony probation for a violation of Vehicle Code section 10851(a) at the time of he committed his first degree residential burglary.

His conviction on January 30, 2018 for first degree residential burglary is highly concerning given that this is not the first time he has been involved in a residential burglary. In 2012, Inmate Haines pled to a violation of Penal Code section 475(c), instead of a Penal Code section 459 1st. Inmate Haines and his friend, P [REDACTED], learned victim would not be home and had a safe in the house. P [REDACTED] told Inmate Haines to get a crowbar and take him to the house. Inmate Haines did so. P [REDACTED] then broke into the house and stole the safe. The two then went to a nearby park and broke open the safe. Inside the safe were blank checks. The two wrote checks out to themselves. Inmate Haines was later stopped in car with P [REDACTED]. Inmate Haines possessed a stolen check from the safe made out to himself for \$900. Inmate Haines admitted his role in the burglary.

In addition, in 2014, Inmate Haines was convicted of a violation of Penal Code section 422 in Placer County. In that case he got into a disagreement at a club, said he'd get his "piece" and kill the bouncers, and then came back and threatened them with a replica handgun.

Given that he was on felony probation at the time of his current strike offense, along with the fact that he has been involved in a residential burglary before, and given that he has a serious Penal Code section 422 conviction, the People feel he is a danger to society.

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on Inmate Haines' prison conduct. However, from the record that is available it is clear that Inmate Haines should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied
