## Re: FERNANDEZ, DALMACIO, ROSALIO - CDC # BL4181 - Court Docket: 19FE016552

Inmate Fernandez should not be paroled early. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of criminal activity to the community.

On August 19, 2019, Inmate Fernandez and at least two other associates were hired to conduct maintenance on an apartment complex where Victim resided. Inmate Fernandez entered Mr. apartment through an open bedroom window and stole a number of items including electronics, collectable clothing, as well as debit and credit cards. At approximately 4:30 p.m. that day, Mr. received an alert that his debit card was being fraudulently used at a local Walmart. He returned home and found his apartment had been burglarized while he was at work. Latent fingerprints were found inside of Mr. home which matched Inmate Fernandez.

In addition, surveillance footage from Walmart showed Inmate Fernandez present in the store at the time Mr. **Second Second** debit card was fraudulently used, as well him driving the same vehicle he arrived at the apartment complex in earlier that morning. Further investigation of Inmate Fernandez's residence in Fairfield, California, revealed he was in possession of many of the stolen property items from Mr.

This was not an isolated incident for Inmate Fernandez. In 2014 he was convicted of another Residential Burglary (PC 459 1<sup>st</sup> Degree) and sentenced to four years in State Prison. Inmate Fernandez's bold and brazen if not dismissive attitude towards the sanctity of another person's home speaks to the dangerousness he poses to society in general. His criminal proclivity towards residential burglaries represents one of, if not the most, dangerous situations for all parties involved. A fact that should not be overlooked when considering early parole.

As we are only given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one-page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on Inmate Fernandez's prison conduct. However, from the record that is available, Inmate

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Fernandez should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of criminal activity to the community. Early parole should be denied.
