Inmate Story is a well-established violent felon and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community.

Inmate Story is a serial thief who has wreaked havoc on the citizens of California and Washington for over three decades. His criminal history includes the current conviction for vehicle theft, various drugs and theft convictions, and one felony conviction for manslaughter. At the time he committed his current offense, he had five prior convictions for the same conduct: stealing someone else's car. The only gaps in his criminal history since 1991 are from when he was serving a prison or county jail sentence. Inmate Story takes advantage of hardworking citizens by stealing older cars that are easier to break into.

As technology has advanced, it has become harder to drive away with cars without the proper key or key fob. Inmate Story circumvents this issue by stealing older cars of lesser value. This is especially problematic because the people that usually own these cars do not have the means to easily replace their cars.

Those victims wake up in the morning to find their car stolen and have no way to get to their job. For these victims, the impact stretches past simply having their car missing. This cycle continues to happen every time Inmate Story gets out of custody: he gets out of custody and repeats the same conduct, stealing someone else's car. He should not be rewarded for this outrageous conduct with an early release. All that does is make it so that he is ready to victimize the next person that much sooner.

When arrested for the current commitment offense, Inmate Story was found in possession of two shaved keys. These types of keys are typically manufactured by thieves who regularly steal cars. It is significant that he had two of these keys, because one clearly would not have worked on the stolen car that he was seen driving. This necessarily means that Inmate Story is regularly ready to take advantage of any situation and steal any car that he feels he can get into. There is little doubt that Inmate Story poses a significant risk of substantial future criminality if released early.

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one-page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on Inmate Story's prison conduct this past year. However, from the record that is available, it is clear that Inmate Story should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of future criminality to the community. Parole should be denied.
