Inmate Siacksorn has demonstrated a willful disregard for the law and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of continued criminality and risk to the community.

Inmate Siacksorn began his criminal career in 1994 when he was convicted of felony 2nd degree burglary and given jail time and probation. The following year, Inmate Siacksorn entered the home of his aunt, went into her bedroom and pointed a firearm at her. Inmate Siacksorn then instructed his accomplices to search the home for money, as they did so he continued to point the gun at his aunt and threatened to kill her. At one point, he ripped a necklace off the victim's neck. Inmate Siacksorn and his accomplices fled before law enforcement arrived. He was convicted of first-degree burglary with a firearm and received 6 years in state prison. In 2004, he was sent back to state prison for 11 years after being convicted of possessing cocaine, methamphetamine, and marijuana for the purposes of sale.

His criminal behavior only escalated upon his release from prison. On May 11, 2016, Sacramento Sheriff's deputies attempted to stop Siacksorn for driving a vehicle without plates. Siacksorn fled, leading deputies on a chase through Oak Park while speeding and running stop signs. Along the way officers watched the inmate throw a handgun out of the window. The chase continued onto Highway 99 until Siacksorn exited on Broadway, where a deputy conducted a PIT maneuver. Siacksorn lost control of the vehicle and ended up on a sidewalk. The pursuing deputy also lost control of his vehicle and crashed into a tree. The deputy sustained significant injuries during the crash including a torn ACL, torn rotator cuff, and a fractured rib.


After refusing to exit the vehicle, Siacksorn was able to restart the vehicle and led deputies on a second pursuit down Broadway and Martin Luther King Boulevard while running red lights. Siacksorn turned onto 15th Avenue and jumped from the moving vehicle, causing it to crash into a parked vehicle. Siacksorn then fled on foot but was found hiding in a nearby backyard by a K9 unit. The vehicle Siacksorn was driving had recently been reported stolen and he was still on parole at the time. Deputies searched for the handgun thrown from the vehicle but were unable to

locate it. Inmate Siacksorn was found guilty by a jury of charges related to felony evasion from police causing injury and possession of a stolen vehicle. He was sentenced to 17 years 4 months in state prison on June 8, 2017.

The Parole Board denied parole to Inmate Siacksorn on May 18, 2023 due to Inmate Siacksorn's current violent offense, his prior criminal history, and limited engagement with programs at CDCR. Given that only a year has passed since the Parole Board made this decision, the Parole Board should continue to deny Inmate Siacksorn's parole given nothing has changed regarding his criminal history or the circumstances of his current offense.

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one-page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on inmate Siacksorn's prison conduct. However, from the record that is available it is clear that inmate Siacksorn should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Further, supervised release has proven to be no deterrent for crime for Inmate Siacksorn. If released, he will be quick to resume the same conduct. For these reasons, we respectfully request that early parole be denied.
