Inmate Harmon is a dangerous man who has demonstrated a willful disregard for the law and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of continued criminality and risk to the community.

Inmate Harmon's criminal history dates back twenty years. In 2005, he was convicted of a felony hit and run, misdemeanor theft, two felony car thefts, and another felony for possession of stolen property. In 2007, Inmate Harmon sustained a parole violation and was convicted of narcotics possession. In 2008, he was convicted of narcotics possession once again. In 2009 and 2010, Inmate Harmon demonstrated his continued disregard for the rules of supervised release by violating parole twice more. In 2011, Inmate Harmon was sentenced to prison for the first time after evading police in a vehicle. Shortly after being released in 2012, he was convicted of narcotics possession and misdemeanor vehicle evasion.


Inmate Harmon's pattern of automobile-related crime continued the following year when he sustained convictions for driving under the influence, driving without a valid license, and another felony vehicle evasion. In 2015, he was convicted of felony vandalism and another misdemeanor vehicle evasion. In 2016, Inmate Harmon was found to be a felon in possession of a firearm and narcotics and once again sent to prison for a term of three years. However, it appears that he was granted an early release because Inmate Harmon's criminal conduct expanded to Washington state in 2017. There, he was sentenced to seven years and three months in state prison for crimes related to kidnapping, robbery, and unlawful firearm possession.

Once released from a Washington prison, Inmate Harmon returned to California. On August 20th, 2023, a concerned citizen in Sacramento County discovered Inmate Harmon sleeping in a vehicle with a firearm in between his leg and the driver's seat, in plain view. Law enforcement contacted Inmate Harmon, and a search of his vehicle revealed another firearm in a backpack on the passenger seat, along with methamphetamine, three cell phones, a scale, and 30 small baggies. He also had a large sum of cash on his person. He was sentenced to six years in prison on March 18, 2024.

Since his first adult conviction, Inmate Harmon has had no break in his criminal conduct that is unmarked by incarceration. Each time he is given the incredible opportunity of supervised release, he reoffends. His crimes show a pattern of escalation.

As we are given 30 days to respond, we have not been provided with Inmate Harmon's disciplinary history. However, given his criminal record and the recency of his sentence, it is unlikely that Inmate Harmon has reformed his ways. He has only served a fraction of his sentence. Supervised release has proven to be no deterrent for Inmate Harmon, and more specifically his ability to obtain illegal firearms. If released, he will be quick to resume the same conduct. For these reasons, we respectfully request that early parole be denied.
